Concept Note

Human development in the 21st century is imbued opportunities challenges. with and New strongly impact emerging innovations and developed economies, changing power structures, hierarchies, and human relationships in both private and public spheres. Led primarily by western economic and political models, marketcontrolled, commercial systems tend to dominate our attitudes towards ecology, education, health and governance. Such a worldview reduces diversity and works in favor of cultural, economic and political homogeneity. This creates a flux especially in traditional societies (which in most cases are also emerging economies), making it difficult for them to keep pace with a technologically advancing, new world order. Sustainability of human civilizations and natural environments (or ecological niches) is under Paradoxically, compared threat. to their predecessors, human beings today are leading a much 'better' life than before. More human beings today live longer and healthier lives and are 'free' from political slavery, however, are imprisoned in new kinds of structural slavery than before.

In a dynamic and sometimes unstable context, issues of self, identity, sexuality, gender roles, life stage transitions, homogeneity, diversity and social harmony emerge more intensely than before. Existing family systems and functions are strained due to the changing context and this deeply impacts developmental outcomes for individuals, families and communities. The major focus of this conference is to understand the impact of rapidly changing, globalized (and postglobalized) contexts on lifelong development and wellbeing. The conference strongly encourages discussions on cross-cultural, indigenous, and Indian perspectives that have potential to pave the way forward in responding to these challenges in culturally sensitive ways.

The conference aims to bring together scholars from within Human Development and Family Studies and allied interdisciplinary fields. The conference especially focuses on the South and South East Asian regions to deliberate upon human development issues and policy-related matters in a globalizing context.

Objectives

- To deliberate upon issues of survival, development, vulnerability and resilience in the early years and childhood.
- To discuss youth studies in the context of the positive youth development framework.
- To examine changes in adulthood and aging experience in traditional but technologically advancing societies.
- To understand the critical interface of culture, human development and digital socialization.
- To appraise the family and workplace contexts with reference to human development outcomes and gender issues across cultures

The conference will include keynote addresses and plenary sessions on select themes by renowned national and international scholars from across disciplines. There will be parallel sessions for individual paper and poster presentations.

A pre-conference workshop on 'Academic Publishing and Grant Proposal Writing' is planned for early career scholars.
